Dental therapists are critical to expanding access to dental care where it is most out of reach, providing timely, quality care to rural, low-income communities and communities of color, and to patients who have coverage through Apple Health or are uninsured.

House Bill 1317 and Senate Bill 5392 would expand dental care access by authorizing dental therapists, primary oral health professionals who complement the work of other health care providers. Dental therapists provide routine, preventive and restorative care as part of a dentist-led team.


What is Dental Therapy?

Dental therapists are primary oral health care providers that deliver routine preventive and restorative care to those who need it most. The profession was first introduced to the United States in 2005 and in 2015, the American Dental Association's Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) established national standards for dental therapy education programs. Dental therapists are already working in Washington for the Colville Tribes, Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe, Lummi Nation, Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe and the

Swinomish Indian Tribal Community.

For too many Washington families, oral health care is out of reach.

37 out of 39 counties have too few dental professionals to meet local needs.



Oral Health Facts

- Dental problems are the #1 reason people without insurance visit the ER, costing WA taxpayers \$35 million annually.
- 85% of the services dental therapists provide are routine and preventive to curb painful and costly treatments.
 - According to a March 2019 poll, 62% of Washington voters support dental therapy.
